Stand up for Marriage!

The future of the covenant of Holy Matrimony is in jeopardy in New Jersey. You may have read in the paper or heard on the news that the state Senate Judiciary committee released a bill this week that will allow marriage for same sex couples. The bill listed as S-1, and its companion legislation A-1 in the Assembly are considered prime bills by the majority party in the legislature. The assigning of a number less than 100, especially a number one is considered by them to be the most important bill of the session. It is unbelievable and shameful to think that some legislators would consider the dismantling of the traditional marriage covenant to be the most important bill to be considered in this session of the legislature.

Marriage is a solemn gift of oneself to another with the intent of self-giving love to another of the opposite sex and for that gift to be shared with children. This sacred sacrament cannot be mitigated or decimated for some political cause. It falls in line with the covenant relationship

that God had with Adam, the covenants with Moses and Abraham, and the calling of the love of one man and one woman as noted in the New Testament.

Scriptural references abound:

"Therefore shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall cleave unto his wife: and they shall be one flesh" Genesis 2:24

And the Lord God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable for him...So the Lord God cast a deep sleep on the man, and while he was asleep, he took out one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh. The Lord God then built up into a woman the rib that He had taken from the man." Gen 2:18, 21-22

"Wives, be subordinate to your husbands, as its proper in the Lord. Husbands, love your wives, and avoid any bitterness toward them." Col 3:18-19

This wonderful gift of Holy Matrimony has been present for centuries. Marriage is a joyful experience, and even dates to the joy at the Wedding feast at Cana. It was at Cana that our Lord delighted the guest and the married couple when he heard his mother's request and turned water into the finest wine.

Prior to the seminary, I was a legislative aide in the state legislature. This was an issue then, and I personally wrote the Defense of Marriage bill for New Jersey legislature that would codify the constitution, but the legislature and governor at the time failed to do its job because they thought there never would be a challenge to marriage laws. They did not wish to join the governing bodies of nearly 35 states that expressed constitutional intent to protect marriage between one man and one woman. Unfortunately, the legislators were wrong and now we have to act. Marriage between a man and a woman is governed not only by civil, and Church law, but natural law.

Our forefathers established the nation based on morals. It was with their intent that the Creator was the ultimate governor of law. The laws were written then for the establishment of marriage as something between a man and a woman. Covenants are established by making an oath - an oath that creates kinship between the two who are making the covenant. The word sacrament comes from the Latin word for oath — sacramentum, thus the relationship that leads to Marriage is an oath to God and each other.

The fruits of Marriage and the gift from God is offspring that is produced with full cooperation between all parties. The gift that is spawned from conjugal relations is a gift from God. This can only morally take place between a man and a woman in such a relationship. The intimate relationship that God desires to have with man lends to the marital union and covenant to gloriously reveal the very image of God through life.

The laws that have been enacted in some places like Massachusetts and the District of Columbia has prevented the Catholic Church from offering adoptions through Catholic Charities. Laws that force Catholic Charities to offer adoption to same sex couples is not a benefit to the child, and thus has caused this change.

You will hear the argument that this is a civil rights issue, but that is bogus. To link a covenant relationship that is natural between a man and a woman to something else has little basis. What is next, marriage between a man and an animal, because I love my pet, and my pet loves me?

Maybe polygamy will be considered acceptable? I don't mean to be sarcastic, but where are we heading if we are going to use the equality debate? When and where does it end?

In our hands rests the pen to lend our voice on this issue and stand with the Church to oppose such ill-thought, and politically motivated plans to enact such law. If this is enacted, and we fail to act like the legislature in the 90's, then we only can blame ourselves. However, if we stand up and be counted, future generations and marriages between a man and a woman, can thank this generation for standing up for the Sacrament of Marriage and keeping it sacred.

My brothers and sisters, the time is now to act, not later! The time is now to let the Catholic voice be heard. We are Catholics! Let the world know this by our love, devotion, and belief. Let our elected officials know we stand for Marriage between one man and one woman.

Candlemas Day - Feast of the Purification

February 2nd was originally called the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin and now is known as the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. It is a relatively ancient celebration, observed as early as the first half of the fourth century. This feast celebrates the presentation of Christ in the temple at Jerusalem on the 40th day after His birth and was considered the end of the Christmas Season. In Europe you can often find Christmas decorations and Nativity Scenes on display until this feast. Many Orthodox Christians celebrate this event by bringing beeswax candles to their local church and requesting these candles to be blessed for use in the church or at home, thus this feast is often called Candlemas Day. This year we will bless candles at the 8:00 AM Mass and have them available for you to take and use them in your home.

Blessing of Throats - St. Blaise

The blessing of St. Blaise, also known as the blessing of throats, is given on the Feast of St. Blaise (February 3). It is a special blessing in which the faithful invoke the saint's intercession, asking him to protect them from ailments of the throat and every other illness. The blessing of throats is related to this Saint's healing of the boy who was choking. We will offer the blessing of throats on Friday, February 3rd at the 8:00 AM Mass and the 7:30 PM Polish Mass. Also Blessing of Throats will be available following all the Masses next weekend, February 4-5.



Now that the words are beginning to become more familiar to us, we look again at the richness behind the words we pray.

The Gloria

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal describes the Gloria as "a most ancient and venerable hymn by which the Church, gathered in the Holy Spirit, glorifies and entreats God the Father and the Lamb" (no. 53). Much of the text of the Gloria comes from Scripture: the first lines are derived from the Angels heralding the glad tidings of Christ's birth in Luke 2:14 – "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." The opening words ("Glory to God in the highest") also correspond to the Latin, "Gloria in excelsis Deo" – a phrase universally familiar from the popular Christmas carol, "Angels We Have Heard on High."
