

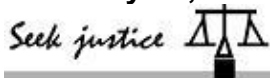

READINGS FOR January 29, 2017



Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Zephaniah 2:3, 3:12-13

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:26-31

Gospel: Matthew 5:1-12a

FROM THE DESK OF FR. MICHAEL 63,000,000 AND COUNTING LET'S END ABORTION NOW!

Today marks the 44th Anniversary of the *Roe v Wade* decision that legalized abortion through a woman's right to privacy. In the landmark ruling, the Supreme Court said in part: if the personhood of a pre-born child is established

the abortion case collapses, because the fetus' right to life is then guaranteed specifically by the Constitution. Simply the justices didn't recognize human personhood beginning at fertilization nor did they recognize that the fetus has the Right to Life. Their decision was void for the fetus, and only considered the mother. But did it really consider the woman?

Abortion is not a cure for the mother, but rather a curse, for it has many lasting effects.

Contrary to the claims by abortion providers that women are able to live a normal life after the abortion, women are deeply troubled and have lasting pain and hurt. They experience guilt, anger, rage, depression, and low self-esteem. The effects of the abortion have caused some to attempt or commit suicide, or engage in alcohol or drug abuse. Simply, abortion is not a procedure but a life altering action.

The Church offers help to any woman seeking assistance with a pregnancy. We also will assist any woman who has made the decision for abortion by healing through Project Rachel. Women, you do have a resource and it's God and His Church, and not an abortionist.

To defeat the misguided belief that it is acceptable to destroy these young children in the womb, we need to take three steps: Pray, Educate, Advocate.

Like all things, we need to start with prayer. Through prayer, all things are possible. We need to dedicate a prayer a day to end abortion, and spend time praying in front of the Blessed Sacrament for life. Through prayer, we can end this scourge.

We need to educate our fellow brothers and sisters to the importance of life. We need to educate expectant mothers about the joy of motherhood and that every child deserves to live. A society based on marginalizing the unborn is absent of both love and moral truth.

Our advocacy must take the form of letter writing and calling our elected representatives to support life. We need to educate them that there is life in the womb and not some tissue and that there are some 26 operations that can be performed on children in the womb that can bring about healing from various conditions. These children also suffer pain when they are killed through an abortion procedure.

We also hope that a new administration with a President who promised to support life will appoint justices who will support a strict interpretation of the Constitution, and call for Life to be the law of the land.

This Friday, I will be the main celebrant at St. Peters Church on Capitol Hill. Prior to the march, I will offer Mass for the unborn, encourage the congregation to be Pro-life, and seek people's understanding of the importance to respect human life. I ask you to please do the same on Friday. Please take a moment and offer a prayer for the voiceless 63 million lives who never had a chance to live their dream. Let them not die in vain, but rather live in our hearts. Pray for these children that are now resting with God!

If you made a New Year's resolution for 2017 to make a difference in the pro-life cause, one way to do that is through our prayers and sacrifices.

As the infamous anniversary of the Roe vs Wade decision, which legalized abortion in our nation in 1973, takes place on Jan. 22, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) is asking all Catholics to take part in its "9 Days for Life," a period of prayer and action for life Jan. 21-29.

Each day of the novena provides a different intercession, reflection, information item and suggested action. The novena is available in English and Spanish, and can be received in four ways: a free mobile app, text message, email, or social media.

Undertaking this novena is a prayerful and sacrificial journey for a special intention — the protection and respect of all life.

The novena is much needed because in the 44 years that abortion has been legal, more than 57 million children's lives have been ended, and their parents, grandparents, siblings and many others have suffered greatly in the aftermath.

The novena will also ask us to petition God to protect, not only the unborn but also the hungry, those without shelter, persons with disabilities, and all who are vulnerable.

Pray also during the novena that bills legalizing doctor-assisted suicide, such as the one in our state legislature, will not become law and pray that all those nearing the end of their lives may receive care that respects the sanctity of their lives.

Always remember that the Church recognizes and joyfully proclaims that each person's life has value — from conception to natural death.
